# Alphabet Fun

Find 5 or more <u>pictures</u> that begin with one letter of the week	<b>Create a <u>sentence</u> that uses 5 or more words that begin with one letter of the week</b>	Find 5 or more examples of one <u>letter</u> of the week in print
List a minimum of 5 <u>names</u> of people or animals that begin with one letter of the week	<u>Make</u> an upper and lower case <u>letter</u> out of materials around the house ( <u>2D</u> )	<u>Highlight</u> a minimum of 10 examples of one letter of the week in a newspaper

\*\*Students will be introduced to two alphabet letters each week. They will choose one of the letters to complete a box above. Send all completed projects to school on the Monday after the letters have been introduced. Keep the Alphabet Fun sheet at home and when you complete a task, cross out the box. Once all of the boxes have been crossed out, return the sheet to school. The student will be given a new Alphabet Fun sheet to start again. We will continue to use the Alphabet Fun sheet until the complete alphabet has been introduced.

**All projects will be due on the Monday following the letter introduction.**  
(Refer to the reverse side for instructions on each project)

**\*\*\*Don't forget to print your name on all projects.**

- 1. Find 5 or more pictures that start with the letter. Cut them out and glue them on a separate sheet of paper. Label them. Look in magazines, newspapers, flyers, etc.**
- 2. Create a sentence that uses 5 or more words that start with the letter (alliteration). For an extra bonus, include a picture illustrating the sentence. For example: Sally sat on a soft sofa and sipped soda.**
- 3. Find 5 or more examples of the letter of the week in print. Cut out the letters and glue them on a piece of paper. Use magazines, newspapers, flyers, etc.**
- 4. On a piece of paper, print 5 or more names of people or animals that begin with the letter. For an extra bonus, draw a picture of each.**
- 5. On a piece of paper, trace an upper and lower case letter. Use materials around the house (noodles, marshmallows, cereal, etc) to glue on top of the traced letter.**
- 6. Look through the newspaper to find the letter of the week. Use a highlighter to highlight a minimum of 10 examples of the letter.**
- 7. Create a character using the shape of the letter of the week. You can use the upper case or lower case shape for your character. Draw and color the character on a piece of paper and don't forget to name it. It could be a new comic book creation!**
- 8. Be a detective in your home and find a minimum of 5 objects that begin with the letter. For an added challenge, draw a picture of each object.**
- 9. Brainstorm words that end with the letter. On a piece of paper write down the words. Try to draw a picture of each.**

This is a good opportunity for you to work with your child and reinforce what is being introduced in school. Make it fun!!! By offering choices to do each week with the letters, you will experience a wide variety of activities. These letter activities should create memories for your children including picture cues, sounds, and authentic examples.
